The 4th of July

Virginia Senate puts off fix to VMSDEP Senator Lucas keeps bills from being heard

The VFW was represented at the General Assembly at the Senate Finance Committee hearing. Senate Finance Chair Senator Louise Lucas delayed the

hearing for more than an hour while back room discussions took place.

After the delay, she did not bring any bill to the floor, so later, there was nothing for the Senate to vote on. We now expect the Governor's Repeal and Restore language to be what the House votes on June 28th.

On June 28, the House unanimously passed their House Bill 6003, which could be voted on if Senator Lucas allows it to go to the entire Senate on July 1.

Unfortunately, the Senate will likely not bring HB 6003 to the floor but will attempt to pass their own version. Their bill falls short of restoring VMSDEP benefits in that it allows only for a one-year extension, which is not sufficient time for the proposed study group to reach a reasonable conclusion.

Emails were sent to all the influential Senators to ask for HB 6003 to be heard.

In either case, there will be a Senate study group (Chair Senator Favola, members Senators Reeves, McPike, Roem, and DeSteph) as well as the Governor's Task Force that both Senator McPike and Senator Reeves are on will make recommendations.

I had the opportunity to speak to the committee and stated that "I always considered this the cornerstone program for veterans in Virginia. A promise made is a promise kept."



VA-2024-08 VIRGINIA MILITARY SURVIVORS AND DEPENDENTS EDUCATION PROGRAM

WHEREAS, Chapter 35 of Title 38 United States Code ("Chapter 35") establishes Federal [Veterans'] Survivors' and Dependents' Educational Assistance programs; and

WHEREAS, like many States, the Commonwealth of Virginia, with nearly 675,000 veterans, recognized that Chapter 35 entitlements do not reach deeply enough into the deserving population of survivors and dependents of men and women, inter alia, killed in action or suffering life-long disabilities of ninety percent (90%) or greater as rated by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs ("DVA"); and

WHEREAS, history has shown that veterans' and survivors' education programs (e.g., the GI Bill of Rights – often called the best legislation ever written) more than pay for themselves over time through increased tax revenues generated by an educated populous; and

WHEREAS, even during the Great Depression, Virginia – then a largely agrarian state - established the Virginia Military Survivors' and Dependents' Educations Program (VMSDEP) to provide additional educational benefits, particularly tuition ("waiver") and educational expenses ("stipend") offsets to help defray the costs of higher (i.e., degree-seeking) education in Virginia state colleges and universities; and

WHEREAS, over the ensuing near-century, changes to VMSDEP have universally benefited the intended beneficiaries; and

WHEREAS, during this inflationary economic era – hardly the worst since VMSDEP's inception, the Virginia General Assembly, in seeking to balance their Fiscal Year 2025 budget recently utilized faulty data and methodology, to justify gutting the VMSDEP by making any payments thereunder contingent upon the exhaustion of Chapter 35 entitlements – despite the differing eligibility criteria of the two programs; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly's actions occurred subsequent to established VMSDEP submission deadlines, thereby throwing the Fall 2024 semester into chaos and jeopardizing the uninterrupted college attendance of intended beneficiaries; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly's vote was so radical and patently unjust to the intended beneficiaries, that the Governor of Virginia issued Executive Directive Seven (2024) to immediately establish a task force enjoined to "develop new guidance to minimize the impact of the changes on military families;" and

WHEREAS, without remedial action, the General Assembly's VMSDEP-cutting actions take effect on 1 July, 2024; BE IT THEREFORE,

RESOLVED, that the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States ("VFW") condemns the Virginia General Assembly's short-sighted actions to balance the budget on the backs of otherwise grieving families of the servicemen and women who gave their last full measure of devotion to our Nation's cause; and **BE IT THEREFORE FURTHER**

RESOLVED, that the VFW demands that the Governor's VMSDEP Task Force reestablish the independence of the VMSDEP vis-à-vis any Chapter 35 entitlements, so that entitlements to the former are not contingent upon exhaustion of the latter; and **BE IT THEREFORE FURTHER**

RESOLVED, that the VFW demands that the General Assembly act immediately to reevaluate the cost-benefit of VMSDEP with correct, audited date and vote prior to June 30, 2024 to reestablish VMSDEP for Fiscal Year 2025, and beyond.

VFW Kicks Off 125th Anniversary Commemoration

The year-long campaign will celebrate the VFW's legacy of service

KANSAS CITY, Mo., (June 5, 2024) — This year the VFW enters its 125th year of service to veterans, service members and their families. As such, the VFW has proudly launched a year-long campaign to commemorate the momentous occasion.

The VFW traces its roots back to Spanish-American war when the battle wounded returned home to no health care, benefits and little support. Left to fend for themselves, a group of 13 veterans gathered in a small tailor shop in Columbus, Ohio, to discuss how they could assist their fellow veterans and dependents of their fallen brothers-in-arms.

In fact, they weren't alone. Several small, unaffiliated organizations were taking shape in areas across the United States with a common goal of advocating for veterans' needs, and in 1899, two key groups were established: the American Veterans of Foreign Service and the National Society of the Army of the Philippines. These groups would soon merge to become the VFW. It's mission: To foster camaraderie among United States veterans of overseas conflicts. To serve our veterans, the military and our communities. To advocate on behalf of all veterans.



The VFW would quickly grow in membership and influence, expanding its advocacy efforts to educational benefits, disability pensions and hospital services. The group would also cultivate its local impact initiatives through community service, youth scholarships and programs, and civic engagement activities.

Today, and throughout its storied history, the VFW has led the charge in making available positive, life-changing support and resources through its advocacy initiatives and services to include the establishment of the Veterans Administration. It has played an instrumental role in the passage of every piece of vital veterans legislation and collects \$13 billion in benefits and compensation from the VA annually for veterans.

Today's launch of the commemorative campaign celebrates the VFW's legacy of service with a dedicated microsite, [https://www.vfw125.org/]

commemorative VFW Post program and a sneak peek into an upcoming line of commemorative VFW Store items. New initiatives will be added as the organization builds momentum to its official founding date of Sept. 29 and to its conclusion at the 125th VFW National Convention in August 2025.

Why it's not rude to ignore "Hi, how are you?" text messages from strangers:

A text message from an unknown number that simply says: hi, how are you? seems harmless. Your first instinct might be to respond to see if it's someone you know. Or maybe tell them they made a mistake. But it's best to ignore these type of text messages. Scammers are using this tactic as a conversation starter, so don't text back. If you do, here's what happens next.

The person (a scammer) on the other end of the text will probably apologize...and find a way to keep the conversation going to befriend you. Then, once they have your trust, they'll try to offer you advice on investing in cryptocurrency or claim they can teach you the secrets to making big money in the crypto markets. For a fee, of course. But it's all a scam and they'll just steal your money.

Even if you just reply to the text but don't engage in conversation, you've still confirmed they reached a working telephone number. Which could lead to more calls and texts from scammers.

What's the best way to avoid scams if you're getting messages from numbers you don't recognize?

Don't reply to text messages from unknown numbers. It could lead to a scam. Delete and report them using your phone's "report junk" option or forwarding unwanted texts to <u>7726 (SPAM)</u> and unwanted emails to your email provider.

Never click links in an unexpected message. Some links might steal your information, or install malware that gives scammers access to your device.

Don't trust anyone who says you can quickly and easily make money. Every investment has risks. Only scammers guarantee you'll make lots of money in a short time with zero risk.



VFW submitted its fourth Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to VA requesting documentation about unaccredited companies that provide services to claimants seeking VA benefits. We have received two interim responses from VA to date on this request and anticipate additional responses to be forthcoming. Among the documents provided is a letter sent to a company called REE Medical, dated January 4, 2024, in which VA points out that REE Medical is prohibited from assisting in the "preparation, presentation, or prosecution of VA benefits claims." VA requested a response from REE Medical within 30-days of receipt of the letter to address the concerns raised in the letter. No response was provided in the documents received.


